


Proposed Shenandoah Mountain National Scenic Area

All roads would remain open.




What is a National Scenic Area?

- Designated by Congress to protect the:
 - Scenic
 - Cultural
 - Historic
 - Recreational and
 - Natural resources

of a tract of public land while allowing compatible uses.















- Strong permanent protection for Harrisonburg's municipal water supply.
- Keeps water treatment costs down.
- Prevents erosion and siltation.

Future Water Needs

Legislation will support:

- maintenance of and improvements to existing dams and reservoirs;
- tapping into existing reservoirs for municipal use;
- establishment of new reservoirs, if needed, for the public good;
- setback of boundaries at a distance recommended by the City to allow for flexibility to meet future needs

Boundaries will be set back to allow for expansion and access.

- Scenic driving








Economic Benefits




- Draws tourists to the west

Shenandoah Mountain at Risk


- Underlain by Marcellus shale
