5.c. Consider enacting Section 13-1-51.1 Bicycle Lanes of the Harrisonburg City Code

<u>Review & Presently, the locations of many bus stops require Harrisonburg Department of Public Recommendation:</u> Transit (HDPT) vehicles to stop in bicycle lanes temporarily in order to allow

Transit (HDPT) vehicles to stop in bicycle lanes temporarily, in order to allow passengers to board and disembark. Section 13-1-51.1 clarifies that HDPT vehicles, including school buses, are permitted to stop in bicycle lanes for this limited purpose and only after ensuring it would be safe to do so, while additionally clarifying that this is

the sole circumstance in which a vehicle is permitted to stop in a bicycle lane.

5.d. Consider amending and re-enacting Sections 1-1-6 Penalties of the Harrisonburg City Code

<u>Review &</u>
The amendment to Section 1-1-6 inserts a catch-all provision to ensure no penalties <u>Recommendation:</u> imposed by the City exceed the penalties provided by state law for a similar offense.

State law prohibits localities from providing for a more severe penalty for violation of an

ordinance than the penalty would be under state law for a similar offense.

5.e. Consider amending and re-enacting Section 13-1-61 Issuance of residential parking permits to certain residents and businesses of the Harrisonburg City Code

Review & Recommendation:

The amendment to Section 13-1-61 adds a provision allowing up to five (5) residential parking permits be issued to businesses operating in a residential parking area that were operating at the location prior to the passage of this ordinance. This will ensure already-existing businesses have sufficient access to parking, while ensuring future businesses take parking into consideration before opening.

Recommendation:

not be parked near residences, and removes the provision allowing commercial vehicles to park near residences with the written consent of the owner or tenant of the lot. In practice, the time-intensive nature and difficulty of determining whether the commercial vehicle's owner, operator, or driver had the consent of the owner of tenant to park severely restricted the City's ability to enforce the ordinance.
