




Registered Voters 2008 - 2021




Harrisonburg Registered Voters vs Population Comparison



Early Voting at City Hall

- Early voting started on September 17th
- 4,141 voted in City Hall this election
- The Atrium was staffed by 46 officers of election and office staff

State law requires 45 days of early voting for every election

Early voting for smaller elections could be handled inside the Registrars office if COVID-19 and social distancing are not a concern

Campaigns have been allowed to hand out literature in front of City Hall



Election Day, November 2nd

- Polls open from 6am until 7pm
- 8 Harrisonburg Precincts
- Precincts staffed by 98 officers of Election
- Most officers work 16 17 hours on Election Day
- Officers worked to enforce social distancing and to have PPE available for anyone requesting it




This was the last election at the JMU Convocation Center, the Electoral Board will work with JMU to find a new polling location on JMU campus in 2022

Between September 5^{th} and November 6th, the part time staff worked over 920 hours and the Director worked over 500 hours. This includes multiple 10 – 12 hour days.



Officers of Election, Electoral Board and Volunteers

- 46 officers for early voting with an average of 4 officers a shift
- 11 officers for drop off locations
- 98 officers on election day with an average of 10 officers per precinct
- 3 Electoral Board members that put in countless hours during early voting and on election day, not including the after-election canvass they are required to perform
- 2 Volunteers that put in a total of 40 hours over the course of the election
- All officers attended training provided by the Director of Election and Office staff. We had 8 training sessions lasting around an hour and a half each for the November 2021 Election

- Ballot on demand system for early voting to comply with possible new state laws.

- Party Primaries (June 21st)






On Tuesday December 28th, 2021, the Virginia Supreme Court approved the new maps presented by the Special Masters.

- Because the new maps place Harrisonburg in different State Senate and House of Delegates
 Districts, we will be required to mail out every Harrisonburg voter updated voter registration
 documents. We are currently looking at ways to join other localities in a bulk mailing that would
 hopefully offset some of the expense.
- With the new district maps we can now consider updates to Harrisonburg voting precincts. The Electoral Board hopes to have a proposal ready for City Council in the coming weeks. A work session was held on January 6th, 2022, with the Electoral Board, my office, and the city GIS Administrator Chip Brown to start this process.




US House of Representatives



 There are no significant changes for the city of Harrisonburg with this new Congressional district, as we will continue to reside in the 6th district.




Virginia State Senate



- Harrisonburg will now be in the 2nd
 Senate district which is made up of parts of the former 24th, 25th, and 26th districts.
- This district currently has three incumbents, Senators Obenshain, Hanger, and Deeds.



Virginia House of Delegates



- Harrisonburg will now be in the 34th
 House of Delegates district which is
 made up of parts of the former 25th,
 26th, and 58th districts.
- This district has one incumbent, Delegate Wilt.




Redistricting / Precincts

Three areas of concern for Harrisonburg

- Residents of Park View that must drive past 201
 Waterman to get to 203 Thomas Harrison to vote
- EMU campus being split between 201 Waterman and 203 Thomas Harrison
- 101 Simms and 103 Stone Spring have the largest number of voters (but not over the state maximum of five thousand), parts of these precincts may need to be folded into 102 Spotswood or 105 JMU

We should keep the precincts starting with 2 on the west side of 11 and the precincts starting with 1 on the right side of 11, in case the city ever needs to split voting districts by wards again.
