

Scope of Youth Substance Use

2025 Youth Focus Group Responses:

"My friends like to do it [marijuana]."

"...[young] people use vapes because they like the flavors, or they're stressed."

"I can go to the bathrooms, see someone vaping — it's normal. Just a normal day — walked in and had someone vaping in my face, like, I'm just trying to go to the bathroom, it's right there."

Marijuana, prescription stimulants, and NMUPD are among the top 5 illicit substances used by youth in Harrisonburg and Rockingham County

Our Activities

FENTANYL FACT SHEET

Fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid similar to morphine but is 50 to 100 times more potent. It is highly addictive and extremely dangerous when not prescribed and administered in a controlled setting.





Mental & Physical Effects Include:

Fentanyl works by binding to the body's opioid receptors, which, over time, makes it hard to feel pleasure from anything besides the drug. Effects include:

- extreme
- · constipation sedation
- drowsiness · problems
- nausea confusion • unconsciousness
- breathing

Treatment



A person can overdose on as few as 2mg of fentanyl. A fentanyl overdose can be treated with Naloxone, which is available as an injectable solution and as nasal sprays (NARCAN).



International cartels are making fentanyl and pressing it into fake pills that look like OxyContin®, Xanax®, Adderall®, and other pharmaceuticals. These fake pills contain no legitimate medicine, and according to the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), 7 out of 10 are potentially lethal.

Local Use



Harrisonburg youth have been negatively impacted by fentanyllaced pills believed to be Percocet. The deadly pills can be bought through various social media platforms.

#FACTS

- In 2023, DEA seized more than 80 million fentanyl-laced fake pills and nearly 12,000 pounds of fentanyl powder. The 2023 seizures are equivalent to more than 381 million lethal doses of fentanyl.
- · Drug traffickers are using social media to advertise drugs and conduct sales. If you have a smartphone and a social media account, then a drug trafficker can find you. They can also find children with social media accounts.

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, deaths involving synthetic opioids, primarily fentanyl, rose in 2022 to 73,838 overdose deaths.


